 Donald Trump (R) <i>President</i>	President Trump has proven his pro-life commitment through his many pro-life accomplishments as president including: appointments of pro-life advocates in his cabinet and administration, restoring the "Mexico City Policy," and he has pledged "to veto any legislation that weakens current pro-life federal policies and laws, or that encourages the destruction of innocent human life at any stage."	At his 2019 State of the Union speech, President Donald Trump called on Congress to "pass legislation to prohibit the late-term abortion of children who can feel pain in the mother's womb."	In 2018, President Trump's HHS Department issued regulations to ensure Title X funding does not go to facilities that perform or refer for abortions. His Administration cut off funding for the UNFPA due to their involvement in China's forced abortion program and he committed to defund abortion providers.
 Bill Weld (R) <i>Former Massachusetts Governor</i>	Bill Weld supports the current policy of abortion on demand. He claims to be "the most pro-choice person you're ever going to meet."
