## INNOCENT CHILD PROTECTION ACT OF 2000

Mr. HUTCHINSON. Madam Speaker, I move to suspend the rules and pass the bill (H.R. 4888) to protect innocent children.

The Clerk read as follows:

#### H.R. 4888

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Innocent Child Protection Act of 2000".

SEC. 2. PROTECTION OF INNOCENT CHILDREN. It shall be unlawful for any authority, military or civil, of the United States, a State, or any district, possession, commonwealth or other territory under the authority of the United States to carry out a sentence of death on a <u>woman while she carries</u> a <u>child in utero</u>. In this section, the term "child in utero" means a member of the species homo sapiens, at any stage of development, who is carried in the womb.

Protection Act, which passed the House of Representatives 417-0 on this July 25, 2000 roll call, would prohibit a state or federal government from executing a woman "while she carries a child in utero." That bill defined "child in utero" in the same language as the Unborn Victims of Violence Act (H.R. 503), which comes before the House this week.
