## Where Do the Candidates Stand on Life? **Adrian Perkins Bill Cassidy**

#### **Abortion on Demand**

There have been 61 million abortions since the 1973 Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision legalized abortion on demand.

Bill Cassidy is pro-life. He opposes abortion on demand, and supports protection for unborn children.

Adrian Perkins supports a policy of abortion on demand, which allows abortion for any reason.

### **Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act**

The Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act would protect unborn children by prohibiting abortion at 20 weeks, a point by which the unborn child is capable of experiencing great pain when being killed by dismemberment or other late abortion methods.

Bill Cassidy co-sponsored and voted for the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act.

Adrian Perkins supports a policy of abortion on demand, which allows abortion essentially until birth.

#### **Taxpayer Funding of Abortion**

Prohibiting taxpayer funding of abortion saves lives. Louisiana's Amendment 1 (the Love Life Amendment) says, "nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to secure or protect a right to abortion or require the funding of abortion."

Bill Cassidy voted against using our tax dollars for abortion. Bill Cassidy supports Louisiana's Love Life Amendment.

Adrian Perkins has not taken a position on Louisiana's Love Life Amendment.

#### **Judicial Nominations to the US Supreme Court**

The fundamental documents of American democracy and freedom, the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, have given us essential principles to be respected by the courts such as the "unalienable" right to life. The next president may have the opportunity to appoint one to three justices to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Bill Cassidy voted to confirm U.S. Supreme Court Justices Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh, who voted this year to uphold Louisiana's pro-life law.

Adrian Perkins refused to say whether he supported Justice Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court.

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
